## International Environmental Justice

- Are countries morally responsible for their actions, or just the people who run them? Asbestos.
- Other issues of international justice?



### Distributive Justice

Distributive justice concerns the allocation of the benefits and burdens of economic activity.

Environmental justice: benefits and burdens with respect to the environment.

Harm principle: harming others is wrong and must be compensated.

Sharing principle: benefits and burdens should be shared equally.

### Other Principles

Cragg and Schwartz: The costs of resource development should be born by those who will reap its benefits.

Needs principle: people in all countries should have vital needs satisfied.

Tension: libertarian versus egalitarian values. Intermediate: utilitarian and difference principle.

### Global Warming

- 1. Water shortages because of retreating glaciers.
- 2. 1 billion lose their livelihoods to desertification.
- 3. 200 million environmental refugees.
- 4. 17 million Bangladeshis without homes by 2030.
- 5. More than 60 million more Africans with malaria.
- 6. 182 million sub-Saharan Africans diseased.
- 7. Homes of 94 million people flooded.

# Arguments Against Equal Sharing of Resources

- Land has been been legitimately acquired and transferred.
- 2. Some countries have depleted their resources.
- 3. Well-being requires security of tenure.
